Report of the Town Council's Activities 2022/23

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INTRODUCTION BY THE MAYOR OF SKEGNESS 2022/23

The Mayoral Year

Dear Resident,

It has been a privilege to be Mayor of Skegness during the last year. I have attended many varied events throughout the year, from meeting bikers on the “Sunset to Sunrise” bike tour who arrive in Skegness at 4.30am after a long overnight ride from Holyhead to opening new businesses and events. The opening of a new bench at a local caravan site took an unexpected turn when the video of the event became an internet sensation and went viral within a couple of days. I have been able to watch performances by talented local schoolchildren, theatre schools and theatre groups and I have met many interesting people at the beginning and end of their journeys. These ranged from an environmentalist setting off on his journey around the coast of Britain bringing awareness of coastal litter to charity cyclists arriving in Skegness after long rides to raise money for worthwhile causes. I have presented awards to local young people for academic achievements in college and out of school sporting events. It has been great to see the familiar Skegness events like the Carnival, So Festival and Christmas Market flourishing again after the disruption of Covid. Skegness is going from strength to strength and is busier than ever. On a more sombre note, it was an honour to read out the Official Proclamation of the new King Charles III to the people of Skegness after the sad death of Queen Elizabeth II. I attended a church service to mourn her passing and helped Skegness Grammar School plant a tree to create a lasting reminder of her reign. My chosen charity for the year has been “Hope for Tomorrow” who do great work bringing chemotherapy treatment to the people of Skegness so they don’t have to travel long distances at this very difficult time in their lives. I would like to thank everyone who has donated to this very worthwhile cause. The highlight of my year in office has been my recent visit to our twin town, Bad Gandersheim. I was invited to open the Skegness Garden at Landesgartenschau, a prestigious German garden show.

COUNCIL AND COMMITTEES

Council comprises 21 Councillors all elected, but there was one vacancy for the last 6 months of the year which was not filled.

The Council takes overall responsibility for all decisions but can choose to delegate authority to a Committee or to a Council Officer but cannot legally delegate decisions authority to a Councillor. A list of delegations can be found on the Council's website www.skegness.gov.uk

To be more effective, the Council has Committees to spread the workload, review issues in more detail and operate more effectively. The Standing Committees comprised Management Committee and Planning and Planning Policy Committee. The Council also has a number of Working Groups or Task and Finish Groups where small clusters of Councillors can focus on more detailed matters and report back to Council or Committee with recommendations. Working Groups cannot make decisions or commit the Council.

The Council has met on 15 occasions, the Management Committee on 7 occasions, and the Planning & Planning Policy Committee on 11 occasions. A total of 33 Council and Committee Meetings were held to carry out Council business.

In addition, several Councillors serve as the Town Council's representatives on various Outside Bodies, Partnerships, Liaison Groups and regularly attend associated meetings.

Planning and Planning Policy Committee

This year the Planning and Planning Policy Committee comprised most Councillors with up to 18 elected members and usually meets every 3 to 4 weeks to achieve consultation deadlines. The Committee has delegated authority from Council to respond to consultation requests in respect of Planning Applications and is also responsible for developing the policy in relation to planning matters for Council to approve. A few meetings have been inquorate and on these occasions the Town Clerk has delegated authority to respond having taken feedback from those Councillors who were available.



The Town Council is a consultee and has no power to approve or refuse applications, simply give an opinion. The Planning Authority that determines Planning Applications is East Lindsey District Council.

The Committee has considered 67 planning applications and informally guided the Town Clerk on 8 applications where responses were made under delegated authority. In each case the Committee decided to support, object or withhold comment. In most cases, objections will be

supported by the relevant Planning reasons why the Town Council objects. In some cases, the Committee's opinion may be conditional. Full details of decisions are contained in the minutes of the Planning and Planning Policy meetings and the comments are also available on the East Lindsey Planning Website <https://www.e-lindsey.gov.uk/applications>

The Council has completed a Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) and submitted this to East Lindsey District Council as the Planning Authority. A referendum of Skegness residents is to be held on 18th May to determine whether the NDP becomes part of Planning Policy.

Management Committee

The Management Committee comprises all 21 Councillors including the Mayor and Deputy Mayor. It has considerable delegated powers from Council and can undertake virtually anything Council can do apart from those matters that only Council can do by law. It is responsible for governance of the operational functions of the Council, including the detailed monitoring of performance, risks and ensuring that the Council's finances are well managed. The Committee is concerned to see that Council functions are operating as expected. From time to time the Committee will identify issues and report findings to Council so that appropriate actions can be put in place.



The Committee also look at issues beyond the current year, reacting to new situations and legislation, developing new policies and examining longer-term financial and resource planning. The nature of the business considered means that issues may be examined over a much longer term than operational issues and so may take longer to complete.

During 2022/23 the Committee has been involved in the following:

- Governance of Financial Management and Risks
- Development and review of the Operational Budget
- Review of Internal and External Audit outcomes
- Monitoring progress with the Council's Action Plan
- Reviewing operational matters

COUNCILLOR ALLOWANCES & ATTENDANCE

Councillor Allowances and Expenses

Under the provisions of the Local Authorities (Members Allowances - England) Regulations 2003, Councillors' Allowance for 2022/2023 remained at £500 but in this year the amount is reduced for any Councillor that did not serve a full term. This payment is subject to tax and is paid quarterly in arrears. Councillors may also claim expenses (usually travel) when carrying out official Council business.

All Councillor expenses are checked by the Responsible Finance Officer to ensure these are appropriate and properly incurred.

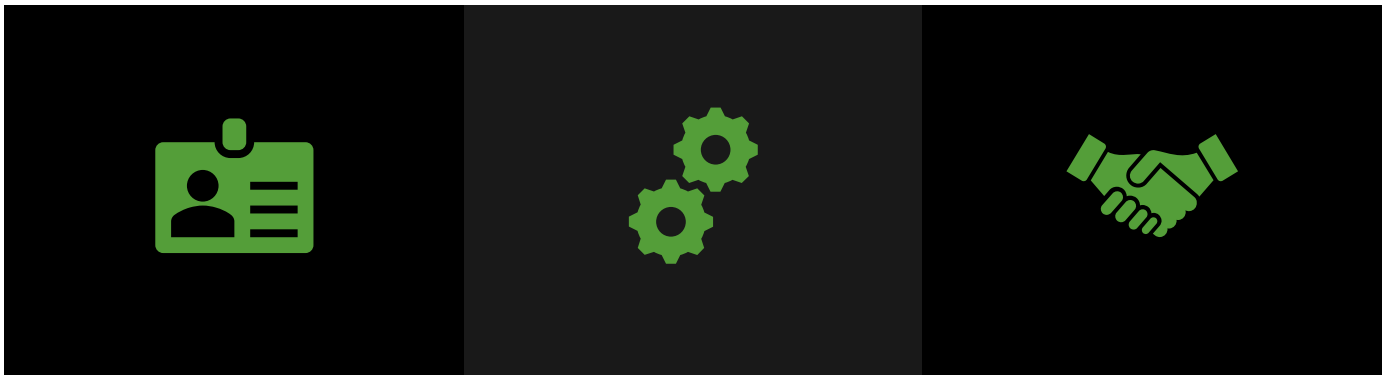

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING 31ST MARCH 2023

Progress during the year

“A difficult economic year with inflation above 10% and lots of expenditure higher than anticipated at budget setting time.”



In many areas costs were higher than we budgeted for. Inflation rose to over 10% during the year and remained at this level to year end. Some of the additional costs have been offset by managing the controllable budgets, delaying purchases, and extending times to slip expenditure to a later time.

The Hall hire and Café contributed £4,704 after stock adjustments, towards the cost of the building which was higher than the £1500 expected at budget time.

General Reserves are just under £170,000. With expenditure at around £775,000 this represents about 2.6 months' worth of expenditure. Given the high level of inflation it will be important for Council to keep this under review to avoid reserve levels dropping if inflation continues to eat into finance throughout the coming year.

Earmarked reserves are set aside for a specific purpose or monies that can only be used for a specific purpose. There has been a budgeted increase to the Capital Reserve of £26,000. Part of this reserve has been transferred to a dedicated reserve for Tower Gardens to include both the Council's agreed match fund contribution for the Towns Fund Project and a

contingency sum to offset the risks of the Council holding the Design and Build Contract. Unspent monies will be returned to the Capital Reserve at the end of the project. There have also been revenue contributions to the Election Reserves so that there is sufficient funds in 2023/24 to pay for the election costs. This reserve also manages the financial risk of a Councillor being unable to continue in the role and a by-election called. Reserves are reviewed at budget setting time and when managing risks.

Council agreed to employ an extra 0.5 of a post to undertake some maintenance work that would otherwise have fallen within the Capital Programme. This has provided a more economic way of delivering the same outcome and has also sped up the completion of works that might not otherwise have been started within the year.

The provisional accounts subject to internal and external audit before approval, are set out below.

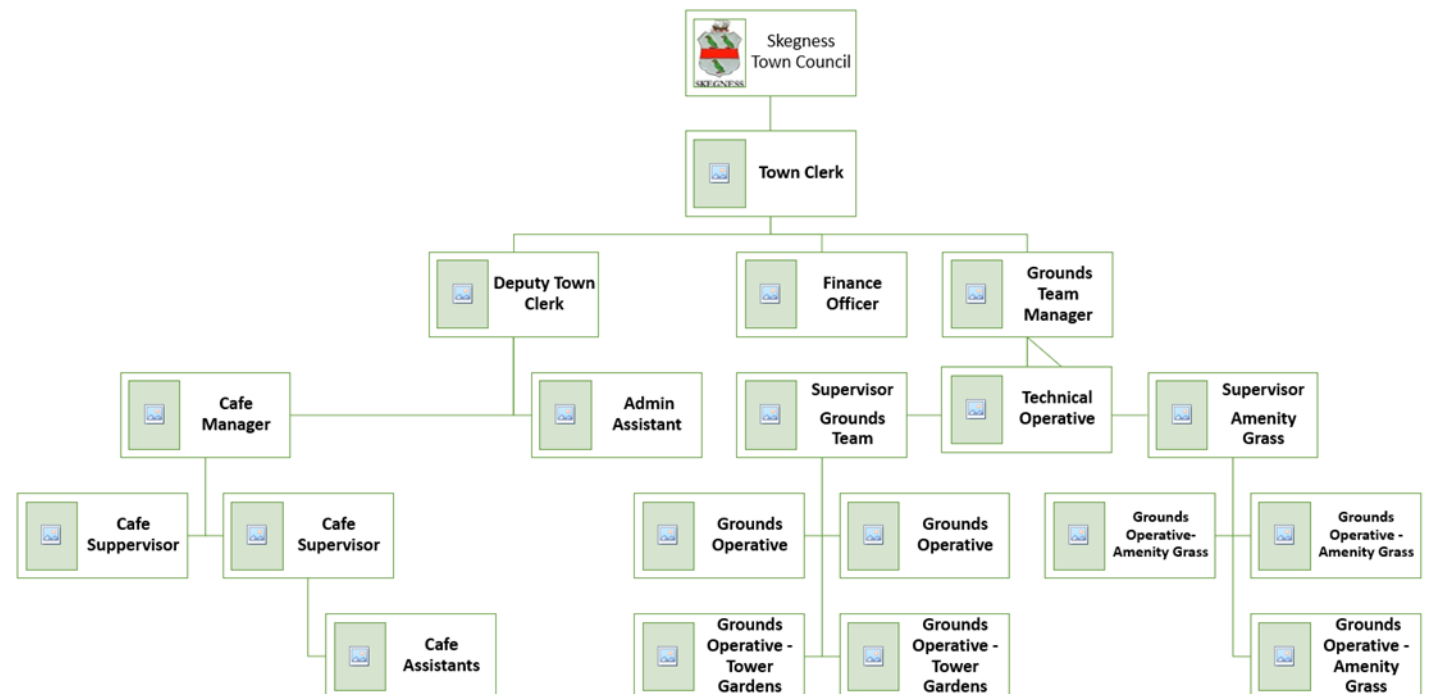

Training and Development

Over the last year employees have taken part in various training and development opportunities including first aid, moving and handling, chainsaw, trailer towing and age awareness. Office staff have completed various online financial, ACAS and election updates including one member of staff completing the Financial Introduction to Local Council Administration. Everyone who works in Café Dansant has completed allergen training this year.

Councillors have been given the opportunity to attend training on Finance and the code of conduct. 2 Councillors have attended Safer Event Training provided by Magna Vitae and those Town Councillors who are also District Councillors have taken up various training opportunities through East Lindsey District Council.

COUNCIL ACTIVITIES

This has been a tough year for Council employees as we all adapt to life after the pandemic, we have had some employees leave due to retirement or a change in circumstances but have welcomed some new employees into the team.

The Town Councils' duties and activities include:

- Management of Tower Gardens Pavilion including Community Hall, Cafe, Office and Changing Places Suite.
- Management of the Cemetery, Remembrance Garden, Tower Gardens, Allotments, Christmas Illuminations and some of the benches, notice boards and bus shelters in the town.
- Management of Scarbrough Avenue Car Park.
- Management of various walks, parish paths and amenity areas including Vine & Coronation Walk, King George V Walk and Beresford Field.
- Management of the play areas on Alma Avenue, Church Road, Winthorpe and Tower Gardens.
- Skegness Town Council no longer provides grants.
- Review and comment on planning applications within the Town
- Liaise with relevant authorities regarding infrastructure /policing/community issues to represent your views and get the best advantage for the local area
- Engage with all interested parties regarding current and future shape of life in the local area.
- Verge grass cutting in Skegness and Winthorpe (delegated areas only).
- Hanging Baskets and Planters (Town Centre, Castleton Boulevard and Tower Gardens Only).
- War Memorial maintenance.
- Neighbourhood Development Plan.
- Charity Street Collection Licensing.
- Remembrance Parade organisation.
- Mayoral and Jolly Fisherman support for events.

This year Skegness Town Council has been working with Heritage Lincolnshire on improvements to Tower Gardens and a Public Realm Refresh in the Town Centre through the Towns Fund.

Café Dansant hosts a monthly peer to peer support group for the RNIB, they have thanked the café staff for taking the time and effort to ensure they feel part of the community by providing accessible menus and taking extra time and care when serving them. Well done team Café Dansant!

The Town Council give financial support to enable a local craft group to meet each week in the hall, the Town Council meets all the costs for the hall and from time to time provides materials to support the groups projects. The group is growing in membership and going from

strength to strength. This group has proved to be a vital support for people as they recover from the Covid pandemic.

In response to the cost of living crisis Café Dansant started a winter soup club on Sundays where a warm bowl of soup, roll and hot drink is provided for only £3. The Council provided various board games, dominos and cards to support the group.

Silver Band Performance

In partnership with Visit Lincs Coast the Town Council has organised for the Skegness Silver Band to play in the bandstand on four occasions. We do hope you managed to enjoy these free performances.

Tree Planting - West Way



Following feedback from residents and support from Councillors trees have been planted in West Way, Winthorpe. The trees were provided through a grant from Lincolnshire County Council and have been planted and cared for by the Town Council's grounds team. This project has not only supported the climate and environmental targets the Town Council has but has solved the issues of illegal occupation on this amenity area and provided a legacy for future generations.

Queens Jubilee

For the Queens Jubilee the craft group very kindly created some crafts to put in a display, Café Dansant got in the spirit with special jubilee bakes and a special performance from the Silver Band was arranged in the bandstand.



Crime Stoppers

At the Annual Town Meeting last year Crime Stoppers gave a very informative presentation that has led to some good collaboration in the Town with other groups. This year they won a national award for Committee of the Year! Well done to everyone involved.

Free Exhibition in Community Hall

In August the Town Council worked with Historic Environment officers from Lincolnshire County Council to put on a free exhibition in the Community Hall for the “Inns on the Edge Project.”



In September Skegness Town Council and Heritage Lincolnshire worked together on a heritage open day. This took place on 15th September and included heritage walks around the gardens terminating in Café Dansant where we held a public consultation on the plans to improve Tower Gardens.

Neighbourhood Development Plan for Skegness

After years of consultation and preparation the Neighbourhood Development Plan was inspected by an independent examiner and was recommended for referendum with only minor amendments. The amended plan was submitted to ELDC but due to a technical error the referendum has been delayed, the Council referendum is due to take place on 18th May 2023.

Operation London Bridge



Whilst we had been preparing for Operation London Bridge it was with great sadness on 8th September 2022 that Queen Elizabeth died and Operation London Bridge was put into effect. The Town Council made immediate changes to its website and social media and lowered the flag. The small hall was used to house a book of condolence for people to come and sign which the Mayor then took round to local care homes for the people who could not get out to sign the book. A place around the bandstand in Tower Gardens was marked out for people to lay flowers and both the proclamation and national minute of silence was marked with small events in the bandstand.

Age Friendly Training & Age Friendly Award

The Council was able to provide the small hall free of charge for the pilot of Age Friendly Training. The Deputy Town Clerk attended the training and along with other staff has put together an action plan to make some improvements. The main take away was to that be age friendly and sustainable you have to make sure you are fully inclusive and value everyone.

Elections - new Councillors training.

It always takes a while for new Councillors to understand their role and the laws and regulations they must work within. During the months following the election training will be provided either internally or via the Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils.

Skegness Town Council signed the Civility and Respect pledge and will be working to implement the associated actions alongside the Code of Conduct.

A new 5-year business plan.

The Council's previous Business Plan has now expired and work will commence with the new Council engaging with the local Community to develop a new 5 Year Business Plan that can also form the basis of medium term financial planning.

Work to Tower Gardens through the Towns Fund.

The 10th May represents the start of a consultation for the Tower Gardens Master Plan. This gives an outline of design for the gardens some of which is funded £500,000 with the balance being aspirational work if and when funding can be found. The consultation period will last until 30th June.
